Notice of First Apportionment, Economic Impact Aid, FY 2012–13 Notice of Fourth Apportionment, Title II-Part A, Fiscal Year 2011–12

The purpose of this bulletin is to notify you that the California Department of Education (CDE) has sent several apportionments to the State Controller's Office for payment.

Notice of Advance Apportionment, K-3 CSR Program, Fiscal Year 2012–13

This advance apportionment, in the amount of \$312,834,401, is made in support of the 2012–13 Kindergarten and Grades One through Three Class Size Reduction Program.

Notice of Consolidated Categorical Apportionment, Fiscal Year 2012–13

This apportionment, in the amount of \$1,944,778,299, is made from funds provided by 25 Items of the Budget Act of 2012 (Chapter 21, Statutes of 2012). These Items support 34 programs whose funding was made flexible pursuant to California *Education Code (EC)* Section 42605 and subject to "5-5-9" allocation pursuant to *EC* Section 14401.1.

Under the "5-5-9" schedule, five percent of the annual entitlement for each program is to be allocated in each of July and August and nine percent in each month thereafter through the following June. The September payment is equal to 19 percent of each LEA's 2012–13 calculated entitlement less the amount previously advanced. LEAs will continue to receive a monthly payment equal to nine percent o their annual entitlement from October 2012 through June 2013.

In order to reduce the number of monthly payments a local educational agency (LEA) receives, the monthly payments for the 34 flexible categorical programs were combined, creating a single payment each month for each LEA. The resulting Schedule of the 2012–13 Categorical Consolidation is posted on the CDE Web page at http://www.cde.ca.gov/fg/aa/ca/consolidations559.asp and shows the total payment to each LEA by program as well as the total combined monthly payment. Individual program schedules are posted on the CDE Categorical Programs Web page at http://www.cde.ca.gov/fg/aa/ca/ under the program name, fiscal year 2012–13.

Notice of Eighth Apportionment, Title II-Part A, Fiscal Year 2010–11

This apportionment, in the amount of \$5,736,072, is made from federal funds provided to the state under Title II, Part A, of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, as amended by the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001, in support of grants awarded to eligible local educational agencies (LEAs) to achieve student academic achievement through strategies focused on recruiting, hiring, training, and retaining highly qualified teachers and principals.

The CDE also has posted the 2010–11 entitlement for each LEA, including those LEAs that are not being paid in this apportionment because they 1) did not apply on the Consolidated Application I, 2) did not have an approved LEA plan, 3) did not report cash balances in July 2012, or 4) did not meet the cash management threshold.

Notice of First Apportionment, Economic Impact Aid, FY 2012–13

This apportionment, in the amount of \$174,999,135, is made from funds provided by Item 6110-128-0001, of the Budget Act of 2012 (Chapter 21, Statutes of 2012). These funds support the Economic Impact Aid program.

This apportionment provides 20 percent of each local educational agency's estimated 2012–13 entitlement. This first apportionment is based on the 2011–12 entitlement.

Notice of Fourth Quarter Lottery Apportionment- 2011-12

The purpose of this e-mail is to notify county offices that the California Department of Education has posted a letter, dated September 28, 2012, to County Superintendent of Schools regarding the 2011-2012 fourth quarter lottery apportionment. The total to be apportioned to county offices of education, school districts, and charter schools is \$109,226,603.60 or \$16.44 (\$16.442867266) per unit of average daily attendance (ADA) for the unrestricted lottery apportionment and \$116,860,645.02 or \$17.59 (\$17.592088385) for the Proposition 20 apportionment.

This apportionment provides 20 percent of each local educational agency's estimated 2012–13 entitlement. This first apportionment is based on the 2011–12 entitlement.

Notice of Fourth Apportionment, Title II-Part A, Fiscal Year 2011–12

This apportionment, in the amount of \$60,632,568, is made from federal funds provided to the state under Title II, Part A, of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, as amended by the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001, in support of grants awarded to eligible local educational agencies to achieve student academic achievement through strategies focused on recruiting, hiring, training, and retaining highly qualified teachers and principals.

NOTICE OF THE ADVANCE APPORTIONMENT FOR THE KINDERGARTEN AND GRADES ONE THROUGH THREE CLASS SIZE REDUCTION PROGRAM FISCAL YEAR 2012-13

This apportionment, in the amount of \$312,834,401, is made from funds provided in Section 91 of Senate Bill (SB) 1016 (Chapter 38, Statutes of 2012). The advance apportionment calculated for each school district or charter school equals 25 percent of the fiscal year 2011–12 pupil enrollment counts submitted on the Form J-7CSR, multiplied by the fiscal year 2012–13 rates of \$1,071 per pupil for Option One (full day) and \$535 per pupil for Option Two (half-day), as provided by California Education Code (EC) Section 52126(g)(1).

The county superintendents of schools were notified of this apportionment by e-mail which was sent to their CDEfisc e-mail addresses. The California Department of Education (CDE) requested that the e-mail be forwarded to the school districts and charter schools in the county, and included the link to this letter and the apportionment schedule which are posted on the CDE Web page at http://www.cde.ca.gov/fg/aa/ca/k3csr.asp under fiscal year 2012–13

Direct-funded and locally funded charter schools that applied for the Kindergarten and Grades One through Three Class Size Reduction (K–3 CSR) Program on their own behalf are listed separately on the apportionment schedule. Funding for charter schools that did not apply on their own behalf is included in the authorizing entity's entitlement if that entity included charter school enrollment data on its 2011–12 Form J-7 CSR and that charter school is still eligible to be included on its authorizing entity's application.

SB 81 requires that 2012–13 categorical funding allocations to school districts that were basic aid in fiscal year 2011–12 be reduced by the lesser of: (1) the district's 2011–12 total revenue limit subject to the deficit factor, calculated as of the 2011–12 certified second principal apportionment, multiplied by 9.57 percent; or (2) the amount of the district's excess taxes. In implementation of SB 81, we have reduced the amount paid to basic aid districts in this apportionment. The amounts reduced are shown on the schedule of apportionment.

The apportionment reduction for basic aid school districts applies to fiscal year 2012–13 only and their entitlement to funds in subsequent years for these programs will not be affected. To view the list of basic aid districts and the total amount to be reduced from their 2012–13 categorical funding allocations, please go to the CDE Web page at http://www.cde.ca.gov/fg/aa/ca/documents/basicaidcut2012.xls.

Warrants will be mailed to each county treasurer approximately four weeks from the date of this Notice. For standardized account code structure coding, use Resource Code 1300, Class Size Reduction, Grades K–3, and Revenue Object Code 8434, Class Size Reduction, Grades K–3.

All school districts and charter schools intending to continue the K-3 CSR Program must submit an Operations Application each year. If a school district or charter school fails to submit a fiscal year 2012–13 application by the statutory deadline of **September 25, 2012 (postmarked)**, eligibility for K-3 CSR Program funding for fiscal year 2012–13 is forfeited and the amount processed in this advance apportionment will be recovered. The amount shall be deducted from the school district's or charter school's next monthly principal apportionment payment after the application deadline, as provided by *EC* Section 52126(g)(2).

The estimated 2012–13 pupil enrollment counts submitted on the 2012–13 Operations Application will be used to calculate provisional funding (estimated entitlements) for school districts and charter schools. A payment of 55 percent of these estimated entitlements less the amounts paid in this advance apportionment will be made in February 2013.

Final entitlements for the 2012–13 K–3 CSR Program will be calculated and adjustments made to provisional funding after actual enrollment is reported on the 2012–13 Form J–7 CSR to the CDE in May 2013. The final apportionment (or recovery) will be paid in July 2013. Details regarding the submission of the Form J–7 CSR will be posted to the K–3 CSR Web page at a later date.

Warrants will be mailed to each county treasurer approximately three weeks from the date of this Notice. For standardized account code structure coding, use Resource Code 0000, Unrestricted, and Revenue Object Code 8590, All Other State Revenue.

The county superintendents of schools were notified of this apportionment by e-mail which was sent to their CDEfisc e-mail addresses. The California Department of Education (CDE) requested that the e-mail be forwarded to all school districts and charter schools in the county, and included the links to this letter and the apportionment schedule which is posted on the CDE Web pages at http://www.cde.ca.gov/fg/aa/ca/consolidations559.asp.

The California Education Code (EC) Section 42605 authorizes complete flexibility by a county office of education, school district, and charter school in the use of funds appropriated in the state budget for fiscal years 2008–09 through 2014–15 for numerous budget items, including the funds formerly restricted to the programs included in this apportionment. County offices of education, school districts, and charter schools may now use the funds formerly restricted to these programs for any educational purpose. The funds are therefore unrestricted and should be accounted for as such. With the exceptions noted below, program and funding requirements as otherwise provided in statute, regulation, and budget act provisional language associated with the funding are not in effect.

The EC Section 42605 (e) provides an exception with respect to the following programs:

Cal-SAFE Child Care: If a county office of education or school district operates the child care component of the Cal-SAFE program, it must comply

with paragraphs (5) and (6) of subdivision (c) of EC Section 54746 regarding the health, safety, and program quality requirements for Cal-SAFE child care and development centers.

National Board Certification for Teachers: This provision requires a county office of education or school district to continue distributing funds to teachers who were in the Incentive Program prior to April 2009 until the teacher has received his or her full award. Funds that are not needed for this purpose are flexible.

Williams and Valenzuela Case Settlement County Oversight: A county office of education shall conduct at least one site visit to each of the required schoolsites pursuant to EC Section 1240 and shall fulfill all of the duties set forth in EC sections 1240 and 44258.9.

Each local educational agency's (LEA's) entitlement to 2012–13 funds from each flexible program was calculated based on the same relative proportion of funds that each LEA received in the base year of funding; this amount was then reduced to reflect the funding decrease enacted in Control Section 12.42 of the Budget Act of 2012. Pursuant to the provisions of EC Section 14401.1, payments for the flexed programs are to be made in twelve installments beginning in July and ending in June. Under the "5-5-9" schedule, five percent of the annual entitlement is to be allocated in each of July and August and nine percent in each month thereafter through the following June. In order to timely allocate funds, the CDE issued an advance payment in August equal to ten percent of each LEA's 2011–12 entitlement. The September apportionment is equal to 19 percent of each LEA's 2012–13 calculated entitlement less the amount previously advanced. LEAs will receive a payment equal to nine percent of their annual entitlement in each month from October 2012 through June 2013. However, pursuant to the provisions of Assembly Bill (AB) 103 (Chapter 13, Statutes of 2012), payments for the month of March are deferred to April 2013.

In order to reduce the number of monthly payments an LEA may receive, the monthly payments for 34 of the flexible categorical programs have been consolidated into a single payment each month to each LEA. The resulting Schedule of the 2012–13 Categorical Consolidation is posted on the CDE Web page at http://www.cde.ca.qov/fq/aa/ca/consolidations559.asp and shows the total payment to each LEA by program as well as the total combined monthly payment.

Individual program schedules are posted on the CDE Categorical Programs Web page at http://www.cde.ca.gov/fg/aa/ca/ under the program name, fiscal year 2012–13. Each apportionment schedule identifies the amount for direct-funded charter schools separate from the district or county amount. Funding associated with all other charter schools is included in the district or county amount. The individual schedules also show the funding reduction to basic aid districts pursuant to Section 57 of Senate Bill (SB) 70 (Chapter 7, Statutes of 2011) as amended by SB 81 (Chapter 2, Statutes of 2012).

SB 81 requires that 2012–13 categorical funding allocations to school districts that were basic aid in fiscal year 2011–12 be reduced by the lesser of: (1) the district's 2011–12 total revenue limit subject to the deficit factor, calculated as of the 2011–12 certified second principal apportionment, multiplied by 9.57 percent; or (2) the amount of the district's excess taxes. In implementation of SB 81, we have reduced the amount paid to basic aid districts in this apportionment. The apportionment reduction for basic aid school districts applies to fiscal year 2012–13 only and their entitlement to funds in subsequent years for these programs will not be affected. Charter Schools that receive funding through the Charter School Categorical Block Grant (CSCBG) are eligible to receive separate funding for the programs included in this apportionment because in lieu funding for these programs is not provided through the CSCBG. Direct funded non-conversion charter schools that were new in 2008–09, however, will not be receiving funds in this apportionment. Instead, for the 2011–12 to the 2014–15 fiscal years, inclusive, they will receive a Supplemental Categorical Block Grant (SCBG) payment pursuant to *EC* Section 42606. The SCBG is equal to \$127 per unit of charter school average daily attendance as determined at the current year second principal apportionment and provides in lieu funding for a variety of categorical programs not included in the CSCBG, including the programs in this apportionment. Pursuant to *EC* Section 42606(b)(2) in lieu of the SCBG, a school district shall provide new conversion charter schools that commenced operations within the district during or after the 2008–09 fiscal year, \$127 dollars per unit of charter school average daily attendance as determined at the current year principal apportionment or a negotiated alternative funding rate.

This grant is also subject to the regulations in Part 299 of Title 34 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) and the federal Education Department General Administrative Regulations in 34 CFR parts 76, 77, 80, 81, 82, 85, and 86.

The funding is appropriated in Schedule (1) of Item 6110-195-0890 of the Budget Act of 2011 (Chapter 33, Statutes of 2011). The California sub-allocation (pass-through) number is Program Cost Account (PCA) 14341.

An LEA whose LEA plan is approved after the start of the 2011–12 fiscal year may charge to this program only those costs incurred subsequent to the State Board of Education approval of the plan. Under the federal Tydings Amendment, Section 421(b) of the General Education Provisions Act, 20 U.S.C. 1225(b), any funds that are not obligated at the end of the federal funding period, July 1, 2011, through September 30, 2012, shall remain available for obligation for an additional period of 12 months, through September 30, 2013.
