Re: Apportionments sent to State Controller's Office for Payment

The purpose of this bulletin is to notify you that the California Department of Education (CDE) has sent several apportionments to the State Controller's Office for payment.

Economic Impact Aid fifth apportionment of funds from FY 2011-12

This apportionment, in the amount of \$138,271,606, is made from funds provided by Item 6110-128-0001, of the Budget Act of 2011 (Chapter 33, Statutes of 2011). These funds support the Economic Impact Aid program.

With the exception of local educational agencies that have received an exemption, approximately 75 percent of the March allocation was deferred to April, pursuant to Senate Bill 82 (Chapter 12, Statutes of 2011).

Adjustment to School District Revenue Limit Apportionments for Student Attendance in State Special Schools, Fiscal Year 2011-12

The California Department of Education (CDE) has sent to the State Controller's Office (SCO) an adjustment to school district revenue limit apportionments in order to capture the excess cost of student attendance in State Special Schools. These adjustments, in the total amount of \$3,191,808, will be deducted by the SCO from the affected school districts' April 2012 principal apportionment payments. Final adjustments will be calculated, equal to 10 percent of the actual excess annual cost for each student, and made in fiscal year 2012-13 once actual excess costs for fiscal year 2011-12 are known.

Apportionment for Pupil Transportation for Fiscal Year 2010-11, April 2012 Certification

This apportionment, in the amount of \$3,672,153, is made from funds provided in Schedule (1) of Item 6110-111-0001, Pupil Transportation Program, of the Budget Act of 2010 (Chapter 712, Statutes of 2010). This apportionment reflects a final recalculation of each local educational agency's entitlement amount.

Sixth Apportionment for the Education Jobs Funds, Fiscal Year 2010-11

This apportionment, in the amount of \$31,202,369, is made to local educational agencies from federal funds provided to the state under the Education Jobs and Medicaid Assistance Act (Act) of 2010 (Public Law 111-226).

**NOTICE OF THE FIFTH APPORTIONMENT
FOR THE ECONOMIC IMPACT AID PROGRAM
FISCAL YEAR 2011–12**

This apportionment, in the amount of \$138,271,606, is made from funds provided by Item 6110-128-0001 of the Budget Act of 2011 (Chapter 33, Statutes of 2011). These funds support the Economic Impact Aid (EIA) program pursuant to California *Education Code (EC)* sections 54020 through 54028.

Letters of apportionment from the California Department of Education's (CDE's) School Fiscal Services Division are no longer mailed to the county superintendents of schools. Instead, county superintendents are notified of each apportionment by e-mail. Accordingly, the CDE has sent an e-mail to each county superintendent, addressed to the county's CDEfisc e-mail address, to inform him or her of this apportionment and request that the e-mail be forwarded to the school districts and charters schools in the county.

Apportionments made to date equal approximately 80 percent of the local educational agencies (LEAs) total 2011–12 entitlements, less funds previously apportioned, less \$387,860, which represents reductions in categorical funding for basic aid school districts, as explained below. The March apportionment would normally have paid 20 percent of LEA entitlements, less funds previously apportioned, but Senate Bill 82 (Chapter 12, Statutes of 2011) required that cash for certain programs be deferred from March to April 2012. LEAs received approximately 4.87 percent of their entitlements in the fourth apportionment paid in March 2012. This apportionment pays the remaining 15.13 percent of funds that were deferred from March. Due to a budget shortfall, each LEA's entitlement has been reduced by 1.17963554 percent. That factor could change slightly in the May apportionment as individual LEA entitlements are revised. A final apportionment of 20 percent is planned in May 2012.

English Language Acquisition Program (ELAP) funds were added to the EIA apportionment in 2010–11. ELAP funds are now part of the EIA funding calculation and can only be spent for EIA-eligible purposes. Also, EIA funds for county juvenile court schools are included in this apportionment pursuant to *EC* Section 54021.2.

EIA entitlements for 2011–12 were posted in November on the CDE 2011–12 EIA Funding Results Web page at <http://www.cde.ca.gov/fg/aa/ca/eia.asp>. Select "Economic Impact Aid 2011 Funding Results," and then select "Schedule of 2011–12 EIA Entitlement Data."

Under the EIA formula, each district receives funding equal to its 2011–12 EIA per-pupil funding rate multiplied by its EIA eligible pupil count; no cost of living adjustment was provided for the current year. The EIA Eligible Pupil count for each LEA is the sum of the following:

- Number of economically disadvantaged (ED) pupils. For most districts, the ED count is the district's Title I formula child count used in its current year Title I entitlement calculation. The Title I counts are primarily based on U.S. census poverty data. The ED count for a small, rural district (district has less than 600 enrollment and was given a small, rural "locale" code by the National Center for Education Statistics), and for county juvenile court schools, is the district's prior year free meal count converted to a figure in lieu of its Title I formula child count.
- Number of English Learners (EL), as reported by the district or county juvenile court school in the prior year R30-LC Language Census.
- A calculated number for each district that has a combined ED and EL pupil count (or concentration) greater than 50 percent of the district's or county office's (for the sum of its juvenile court schools) total pupil enrollment, as reported in the prior year California Longitudinal Pupil Achievement Data System.

There is no restriction on the amount of EIA funds that may be carried over from year to year. For standardized account code structure coding, use Resource Code 7090, Economic Impact Aid, or Resource Code 7091, Economic Impact Aid: Limited English Proficiency, and Revenue Object Code 8311, Other State Apportionments-Current Year.

Senate Bill (SB 70) (Chapter 7, Statutes of 2011) requires that 2011–12 categorical funding allocations to school districts that were basic aid in fiscal year 2010–11 be reduced by the lesser of: (1) the district's 2010–11 total revenue limit subject to the deficit factor, calculated as of the 2010–11 certified second principal apportionment, multiplied by 8.92 percent or (2) the amount of the district's excess taxes. Implementing SB 70, we have reduced the amount paid to basic aid districts in this apportionment. The apportionment reduction for basic aid school districts applies to fiscal year 2011–12 only, and their entitlement to funds in subsequent years for these programs will not be affected. **ADJUSTMENT TO SCHOOL DISTRICT REVENUE LIMIT APPORTIONMENTS
FOR STUDENT ATTENDANCE IN STATE SPECIAL SCHOOLS
FISCAL YEAR 2011-12**

Statute requires the school district of residence of the parent or guardian of any residential student attending a State Special School to pay 10 percent of the excess annual cost of education for that student (California *Education Code* Section 59300). Item 6110-006-0001 of the Budget Act of 2011 (Chapter 33, Statutes of 2011) requires the State Controller Office (SCO) to withhold the amount due from each school district, as reported by the California Department of Education (CDE), from the district's principal apportionment, and transfer that amount to the State Special Schools account (6110-006-0001). The amount withheld will be shown as a separate item in the remittance advice for the principal apportionment payment.

Accordingly, enclosed is the schedule of transfers or "adjustments" for projected excess costs for fiscal year 2011-12 reported by the CDE to the SCO. These adjustments will be deducted by the SCO from the March 2012 principal apportionment payments, scheduled for April 27, 2012. CDE will authorize the final adjustments in fiscal year 2012-13 once actual excess costs for fiscal year 2011-12 are known.

County superintendents will be notified by e-mail, addressed to the county's CDEfisc e-mail address, regarding these adjustments. The e-mail includes a link to the CDE Categorical Programs Web page at <http://www.cde.ca.gov/fg/aa/ca/statespecialschool.asp> where these adjustments are posted. The CDE requested that the e-mail be forwarded to all school districts and charter schools in the county.

For standardized account code structure coding, use Resource Code 0000, Unrestricted Resources, and Expenditure Object Code 7130, State Special Schools.

These funds, appropriated in Section 1(a)(2)(A) of Senate Bill 847 (Chapter 220, Statutes of 2010), are one-time, with an intended use to create and save education jobs in the 2010-11 school year. The amount of Ed Jobs funds available to support kindergarten through grade twelve is \$1.2 billion.

LEAs were required to submit an application for the State Fiscal Stabilization Funds (SFSF) grant to be eligible to receive an Ed Jobs grant. Only those LEAs that submitted the SFSF application, completed the required American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) Section 1512 quarterly report for the period ended March 31, 2012, and met federal cash management requirements are included in this apportionment. As required by federal statute and regulations, federal cash management procedures were applied in order to reduce the time elapsing between the receipt and disbursement of federal funds. The amount paid to each LEA this quarter is equal to 25 percent of each LEA's Ed Jobs entitlement, less the LEA's cash balance as of March 31, 2012. Cash balance was determined by taking the difference between total Ed Jobs funds previously apportioned to each LEA and expenditures or obligations as reported in the March 2012 Section 1512 quarterly report.

Ed Jobs entitlements were calculated based on each LEA's proportionate share, an amount equal to 3.762 percent, of revenue limit and charter school general purpose funding as of the 2010-11 Second Principal Apportionment. Funding associated with locally funded charter schools is included in the authorizing district or county amount. Details about the revenue limit data sources used to calculate the final entitlements can be viewed on the Schedule of Revised Final Entitlements for the Education Jobs Fund at <http://www.cde.ca.gov/fg/aa/ca/edjobsfund.asp>.

Ed Jobs entitlement amounts described above may differ from those posted for prior apportionments. After final entitlements were published in July 2011, California received an additional grant from the U.S. Department of Education for the Education Jobs Fund program in the amount of \$17.7 million. As a result, entitlements were recalculated in March 2012 to distribute the additional funding to LEAs that applied for the program.

Letters of apportionment from the California Department of Education's (CDE) School Fiscal Services Division are no longer mailed to county superintendents of schools. Instead, county superintendents are notified of each apportionment by e-mail. Accordingly, the CDE has sent an e-mail to each county superintendent, addressed to the county's CDEfisc e-mail address, to inform him or her of this apportionment and requests that the e-mail be forwarded to all LEAs in the county, including direct funded charter schools. The letter and schedule for this apportionment is posted on the CDE Categorical Programs, Ed Jobs Web page at <http://www.cde.ca.gov/fg/aa/ca/edjobsfund.asp>.

Warrants will be mailed to each county treasurer within approximately two weeks from the date of this Notice. For standardized account code structure coding, use Resource Code 3205, Education Jobs Fund, and Revenue Object Code 8290, All Other Federal Revenue. The California sub-allocation (pass-through) number is Program Cost Account (PCA) 25152.

Use of Funds

LEAs must use Ed Jobs funds at the school site level only for compensation and benefits and other expenses, such as support services, necessary to retain existing employees, to recall or rehire former employees, and to hire new employees, in order to provide early childhood, elementary, or secondary educational and related services. For a comprehensive coverage of allowable and unallowable uses of Ed Jobs funds, all LEAs should review CDE's letter dated September 14, 2010, posted at the CDE's Ed Jobs Web site at <http://www.cde.ca.gov/ar/ej/>, and the U.S. Department of Education (ED) Initial Guidance for States on the Education Jobs Program at <http://www.ed.gov/programs/educationjobsfund/applicant.html>.

Ed Jobs funds are available for obligation through September 30, 2012. LEAs may not charge expenditures to Ed Jobs funds prior to August 10, 2010, the date of enactment of the Act.

Accountability and Reporting

LEAs must maintain records that separately track and account for Ed Jobs funds. In accordance with the requirements of Section 443(a) of the General Education Provisions Act (20 *United States Code*, Section 1232f [a]), LEAs must maintain records that will facilitate an effective audit and demonstrate that the funds were used in compliance with applicable requirements.

Under Section 101 of the Act, LEAs must fulfill the quarterly reporting requirements under Section 1512 of the ARRA. For additional information on Section 1512 reporting requirements, please see the CDE ARRA reporting Web page at <http://www.cde.ca.gov/ar/rr/>.

Section 101 also requires LEAs to provide annual reports as outlined under Section 14008 of the ARRA that would include information on the number

of education personnel affected by the Ed Jobs program.

Grant Award

The ED award number for this apportionment is S410A100005. The Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance subprogram number is 84.410.

Title 34 of the *Code of Federal Regulations*, Section 80.21(i), requires that any interest earned by LEAs on federal dollars be returned to the ED promptly, but at least quarterly. LEAs may keep interest amounts up to \$100 per year for administrative expenses. LEAs should forward interest payments for remittance to the ED to:
