#### SCCBOE Update

The Santa Clara County Board of Education has elected Trustee Anna Song as President for the coming year, and Trustee Dr. Michael Chang as Vice President. The votes at the Board's meeting were unanimous. Outgoing President Darcie Green was presented with a plaque that included a gavel in honor of her year of service.

#### Call for Delegate Assembly Nominations Deadline - January 7

CSBA is now accepting nominations for Delegate Assembly. Nomination and biographical sketch forms for the Delegate Assembly are now being accepted until **Thursday, January 7, 2016**. Our region is Region 20, and our District Director is Albert Gonzalez.

CSBA Delegate Assembly is a vital link in the association's governance structure. Working with local districts, county offices, the Board of Directors and Executive Committee, Delegates ensure that the association reflects the interests of school districts and offices of education. The Delegate Assembly is comprised of Delegates who are elected local board members in 21 geographic regions throughout the state. Board members elected to the Delegate Assembly serve a two-year term beginning April 1, 2016 and ending March 31, 2018. The Delegate Assembly meets twice each year, usually in May and December.

Potential candidates can be nominated by themselves or by other school board members or their district. The Delegate Assembly forms are available on the **csba.org** website.

#### **President Obama signs ESSA**

President Obama's signing this week of the bipartisan Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), ushers in a new era of school governance that focuses less on federal involvement and more on local control. The Act, the next generation of No Child Left Behind, rebalances accountability oversight of public education between federal, state and individual school districts.

"This is a step forward in helping to increase the effectiveness of educators in carrying out their core mission of providing instruction," said County Superintendent of Schools Jon R. Gundry. "We are reviewing the Act and aligning the resources of the County Office of Education to be in the best position to support the 31 districts in the county."

Some of the main revisions to the law include the repeal of Adequate Yearly Progress, or AYP, and replaces it with comprehensive, state-designed accountability systems. Among some of the highlights, the Act maintains important statewide assessments for students but allows greater flexibility beyond utilizing a single assessment tool. It also recognizes the need to reduce unnecessary testing and affirms state control of standards. While it also helps states to improve low performing schools and supports atrisk populations, it's also designed to improve accountability for learning outcomes for all students.

# **SCCOE Spotlight – Strong Start**

#### Strong Start Initiative: Helping Districts Provide Quality Early Learning Programs by Matthew Tinsley, Ph. D., Director – Strong Start Project

Daunting! In a word, that describes all the classroom challenges school districts have to tackle, including:

- teaching dual language learners;
- supporting children with special education needs;
- closing the achievement gap;
- ensuring reading proficiency by third grade; and
- well, the list could go on.

Like elsewhere, everyone is looking for the elusive silver bullet. And while we may not have exactly that, there is a substantial, research-backed, consensus among the President, Secretary of Education, economists, military and business leaders, legislators and local superintendents, that providing *quality* early learning programs can address these challenges – as long as "quality" remains the operative word. Whether or not school leaders think of themselves this way,the implementation of transitional kindergarten (TK) means that at least 27 districts in the county are now early learning providers. The challenge for districts is not whether to provide early learning opportunities, but how to maximize their benefits: how to increase access while improving quality.

Over the last two years, Strong Start of Santa Clara County has been developing the infrastructure to make universal access to quality early learning opportunities a reality for all our children. Strong Start is a coalition of educators, nonprofit and business leaders, elected officials, and other key stakeholders who are committed to expanding access to high quality early learning opportunities for all children age 0 to 8 in Santa Clara County. The coalition includes members evaluating the quality of early learning programs through the State's new Quality Rating Improvement System, members working to improve program quality through professional development and showcasing model programs, members working to increase resources available to support early learning opportunities through local, state and national advocacy and philanthropy, and, finally, public and non-profit providers and school districts serving children and families every day. Together they form a deep pool of expertise working on specific, concrete initiatives to realize the benefits of quality early learning for all children in the county.

Chief among these initiatives is working with school districts to help them take full advantage of the opportunities they already have. Improving and expanding existing transitional kindergarten (TK) programs through professional development, and exploring ways to wrap half-day TK with preschool, are currently being implemented or actively explored by districts across the county. Districts around the state are providing extended TK – enrolling 4-year-olds who will turn 5 during the school year – to maximize children's opportunities to benefit from the program. Both ESEA Title I and LCAP/LCFF support the use of early learning strategies to improve student outcomes. Not all options make sense for every district, but Strong Start members are poised to reach out to school districts to show them which ones do and help them take advantage of these opportunities. Providing a strong start for every child benefits us all, and every child deserves a strong start.

# **Educational Technology and School Districts**

#### The "How" of Educational Technology - Part 2 by Arati Nagaraj

In my last column I asked if your district has a technology plan. Some of you responded saying yes and some said no. So, **HOW** do you create a Technology plan for your district?

To set expectations, it's not an overnight process. Like everything else in public education, there are many steps and people involved.

First, work with your technology staff in your district to identify a consultant. Why? Because you want an objective point of view and someone dedicated to do this work. Your district staff is busy with day-to-day work and developing a tech plan requires focused attention and diligence. The county office may have resources or ask districts that have a technology plan for referrals.

Next, identify key stakeholders in the school community - students, teachers, business office, district office, counselors, parents, school office staff, administrators - a representation of people who will contribute in the creation of this plan because it will affect each of them.

<u>Needs assessment</u> - what's the current state of technology use in the district, what are the hopes and dreams of technology use. This will give a pulse of what's on your stakeholders' minds. The U.S. Department of Educational Technology is a good resource: http://tech.ed.gov/

<u>Analyze the data</u> - trends and themes will emerge from the data gathered. This will help formulate a vision, mission, and goals for the district.

<u>Develop the plan</u> - with student learning and achievement as the focus, infrastructure, professional development, and instructional materials (see my previous article) are the key pillars of the plan. As you create details for these pillars, think about timeline, budget, and resources. During this phase, communication and keeping stakeholders informed is imperative because this is a culture shift.

Implement and Evaluate the plan - After board approval, the implementation of the plan goes into full gear. Remember, continuous evaluation is necessary to ensure the effectiveness of the plan. We all know that technology changes every second, but we should not be distracted by every new thing that comes our way. Careful review and alignment with vision, mission, and goals is the key to success of the plan.

Remember, don't try and reinvent the wheel - collaborate with other districts who have done this work and then customize it to suit your own. Here is a link for you to review: Saratoga Union School District: Technology Plan June 2014 - June 2017

#### **Moreland School District News**

The Moreland School District just completed its annual Second Harvest Food Drive with participation from its seven schools, District Office and Board of Trustees. Through school to school competitions, food-drive Project Based Learning activities and other fun campaigns, the District raised 12,485 pounds of donated food, which translates to approximately 10,400 meals to those in need in our community. This holiday season also shines with Moreland's award-winning middle school music program. Moreland's music program is excited to offer three winter concerns this month from our elementary honor band/orchestra, as well as our band/orchestra programs from our middle schools. Moreland is also excited to share an innovative way one of our schools is infusing art on its campus! At Easterbrook Discovery School, staff is encouraging students, classes and after-school groups to "yarn-bomb" some temporary chain-link construction fences up around their blacktop. "Yarn-bombing" is a kind of urban art that uses yarn instead of paint to create designs and patterns on ordinary objects. In the hope that this project will take a life of its own over the course of the school year, students will cut down the yarn-bombed mural at the end of the school year when the construction fences are scheduled to be taken away. #### **Gilroy Unified School District News**

Gilroy Unified School District's (GUSD) Rod Kelley Elementary School, Solorsano Middle School and Gilroy Prep School (GPS) were named as three of the top Bay Area public schools for underserved students in a report released last month by Innovate Public Schools. Rod Kelley, Solorsano and GPS were three of 54 Bay Area public schools that achieved strong results for underserved students, specifically in the area of math, demonstrating what students can achieve and setting an example for how all schools can better support underserved students.

Four students from Gilroy High School, Nicole Holder (senior), Savanna Brandon (senior), Skyler Hungerford (junior) and Alex Green (junior), have been selected for the 2016 High School Honors Performance Series at Carnegie Hall. The singers will perform during Carnegie Hall's 125<sup>th</sup> anniversary season in February with the Honor Concert Choir.

In November, GUSD dedicated the gymnasium at South Valley Middle School to former teacher and wrestling coach Bert Mar. Bert positively impacted the lives of thousands of students in the Gilroy community during his three decades with GUSD. Bert was head wrestling coach at South Valley for 25 years, while also coaching track, soccer, flag football and serving as Athletic Director during that time.

#### **Employee Groups and District Form Partnership**

It's an exciting time in Santa Clara Unified School District. The administration has formed a working partnership with two of our employee groups, the United Teachers of Santa Clara (UTSC) and the California School Employees Association (CSEA) Santa Clara Chapter 350.

In May 2015, Albert Gonzalez (SCUSD Board President), Dr. Stan Rose (Superintendent), Michael Hickey (UTSC President), and Patty Picard, (CSEA President) attended the Labor-Management Institute in San Diego. The Institute is sponsored by the California Department of Education. There, they learned how some school districts across the country have formed partnerships between labor and management in an effort to further their collective goal of improving student achievement. They were all inspired by this experience and decided to establish their own partnership. One of the presenters from the institute, Dr. Saul Rubenstein of Rutgers University, came to SCUSD to present to all of the employees at a special kick-off event on August 14, 2015. In his presentation, Dr. Rubenstein spoke about how his research demonstrates that increased communication among members of an organization correlates to an increase in achieving that organization's goals, the largest of which is student achievement. In October, they attended the West Coast Labor-Management Institute hosted jointly by ABC Unified School District and ABC Federation of Teachers. For this visit, the team included Andrew Lucia (Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources), Kathie Kanavel (Assistant Superintendent of Educational Services), and Michele Birchfiel (Director of Classified Human Resources). The Institute welcomed various district/union teams from across the state who shared the successes and challenges they've faced in this work.

On November 12, leaders from an organization called the Consortium for Educational Change (CEC) visited SCUSD and met with various groups of staff, parents, and students at New Valley High School, Laurelwood Elementary School, Wilcox High School, Don Callejon K-8 School, and groups from the District Office. They came to conduct a series of focus group sessions as part of an audit of the District's communication systems. We expect to receive a report from the CEC soon and their team returns in January to meet with district and union leadership to discuss next steps in improving the SCUSD's systems of communication. Subsequently, they will schedule a series of school leadership team trainings/meetings and district leadership team meetings during the 2015-2016 school year. These meetings will focus on encouraging the school sites to listen and learn from each other in an effort to work toward continual improvement.

#### **Evergreen School District News**

Recently, U.S. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan recognized 335 schools as National Blue Ribbon Schools for 2015 based on academic excellence or their progress in closing achievement gaps among student subgroups. Riding high among them was our very own James F. Smith School. The schools were celebrated at a ceremony in Washington D.C. November 9-10.



## **Fremont Union High School District News**

Recently the generosity and heart of the Fremont Union High School District students and staff members have especially been front and center.

Homestead High School students participated in the annual canned food drive and nearly 4,800 items were collected including canned food, condiments, cereal, household and personal items, baby and first aid items, and toys for children.
