The County of Santa Clara Office of LGBTQ Affairs and the Behavioral Health Services Department are offering free online LGBTQ+ trainings for all caring adults connected to middle and high schools across the county. LGBTQ youth are at a higher risk during

the COVID-19 crisis, and this free training will help you, your educators, and staff mitigate some of these harms. As we continue to shelter-in-place, we wanted to make you aware of this training opportunity that is completely online and can be taken whenever your schedule allows.

Step In, Speak Up! is an interactive online training where users will gain exposure to LGBTQ+ terminology and participate in simulated conversations. Users will learn how to respond to biased language, address harassment in the classroom, and support a young person experiencing mental health issues, including suicidal ideation. This 30-minute training allows participants to role play conversations, try different approaches, and get personalized feedback to gain the confidence and skills to navigate LGBTQ+ conversations in real life. All middle and high school teachers, staff, volunteers, and administrators are encouraged to take this training. Read more about Step In, Speak Up! here. Milpitas Xtreme Robotics produce face shield frames with 3D printers

After learning of a shortage of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for healthcare workers, three student members of the Milpitas Xtreme Robotics team with 3D printers immediately shifted gears and began producing face shield braces. Since then, MXR Vice President Kalino Ruiz, as well as team members Nick Azpeitia and Rakesh Mehta, have printed more than 200 face shield parts for local hospitals.

"We look forward to the day when COVID-19 is no longer an issue for us all. But until then, we hope to do what we can to help fight coronavirus," said MXR President Chloe Wang, a 17-year-old Milpitas High School senior who oversees all of the team projects.

Maker Nexus picks up the face shield parts from the students, adds the face guard, and then delivers them to local hospitals for their essential workers.

"We are printing everyday," said Wang, noting that the printers are running up to 12 hours per day to make the parts.
