Community building is necessary to establishing healthy school cultures

Creating school cultures that support young people and minimize violence and bullying requires ongoing work — a topic explored by experts in a Feb. 14 <u>webinar</u> hosted by the U.S. Department of Education, Office of Elementary and Secondary Education's Office of Safe and Supportive Schools, and the National Center on Safe Supportive Learning Environments.

Panelists discussed strategies to shift school cultures and reduce the likelihood of identity-based bullying — an issue that has increased in schools, according to Education Department staff — as well as approaches being implementing in their local educational agencies to reduce conflict and violence, and to shift school climates to be inclusive and accepting of all students.

David Yusem, a restorative justice coordinator for Oakland Unified School District, said building strong, healthy relationships and community are a critical component of the district's efforts to improve school culture.

"Our focus is on building and maintaining relationships across our classrooms, across our schools, across our district. We leverage those relationships to be in right relationships with each other and to create the environment for teaching and for learning, but also for when things go wrong and we need to have difficult conversations," he said. "And so really, it's about community relationships and then leveraging those relationships when there is a harm."

Restorative justice in educational settings uses mediation and community building to shift away from a punitive discipline model by empowering students to resolve conflicts on their own and in small groups. Commonly a piece of an LEA's multi-tiered system of supports, restorative justice practices are split into three tiers, Yusem explained.

Tier one involves everyone in the community receiving proactive support, tier two being smaller groups that may address conflict, and tier three being individualized support that may focus on reintegrating students into the classroom.

"Tier one is really what we focus on, and we are really relentless about training and coaching and mentoring and teaching people to use," Yusem said, noting the importance of regular circle discussions. Restorative justice circles can help identify issues and allow students to brainstorm a resolution agreement that resolves the conflict and can repair the harm. "They might be coming into the classroom ... having experienced trauma or complex trauma over time, and feeling safe is not just automatic," Yusem said. "And so, you have to create a safe and predictable environment. There's something about knowing people in your community and being in relationship with them that makes you not want to hurt them, and the goal is to create that kind of environment in the classroom."

While tiers two and three may require more hands-on involvement with LEA leadership, robust student engagement and leadership across the district plays a vital role in the district's restorative justice practices, he noted.

"It might take some time because it's very different than what people are used to, sitting in circle, waiting your turn. But once students experience the circle process and the restorative justice practices and philosophy, my experience is that they love it and they own it, it's theirs," Yusem said. "They don't have to wait for the experts to come and do it for them. They can do it with themselves, with each other and with others as well."

In order to reach that point, however, community building must be a constant focus for any LEA, and long-term action is required.

"I've seen schools do a little bit of community building before school starts or maybe the first few weeks of school, and that's considered the culture time, and then we just move on and it's just curriculum nonstop until the end of the year," Yusem said. "And we really support building and maintaining community all year long."

Santa Clara County Office of Education Spotlight

Improving Pathways to College for All Students

On February 13, 2024, the East Side Education Foundation (ESEF) held a forum and speaker panel at the Santa Clara County Office of Education (SCCOE) focused on equitable access to higher education. The discussion, "Is College Necessary?" explored how higher education institutions, K-12 schools, and nonprofits can improve pathways for the county's most vulnerable students.

"Preparing students for life after high school requires a future-ready approach to ensure they are ready for their next step," said County Superintendent of Schools Dr. Mary Ann Dewan. "High schools are providing engaging and strong college and career-ready courses of study and pathways."

Because of the collective work of county schools and local community organizations, of more than 19,000 Santa Clara County high school graduates, approximately 15,000 were enrolled in college reported by the California Department of Education for the 2020-21 academic year. The college-going rate in the county was 77.5 percent, as compared to the state percent of 62.2.

"We're helping our students realize that a college education is within their reach, academically and financially," said East Side Union High School District Superintendent Glen Vander Zee. "We provide students the preparation and skills to enter and succeed in college and ultimately their careers."

Over the last decade, ESEF has raised more than \$1 million to support student scholarships. Their premiere support program centers on the Spartan East Side Promise, a pathway to guaranteed admission to San Jose State University for qualifying East Side Union High School District students. Since its inception, more than 1,300 students have participated in the program. The foundation supports students applying and entering the university through the Spartan East Side Promise Summer Program and Scholarship Program.

"While we know not everyone is going to college, it should be a matter of choice, not because of a lack of opportunity," said East Side Education Foundation Board President, Manny Barbara.

Los Gatos-Saratoga Union High School District

Empowering Tomorrow's Heroes: District Trains Students on Narcan In the past two months, District Nurse Lisa Tripp has begun offering Naloxone (Narcan) training to all students at Los Gatos and Saratoga High Schools through either Freshman PE or drop-in tutorial training. With the goal of eventually reaching all Los Gatos and Saratoga High School students, hundreds of students participated in what many call "the new CPR."

With the initial student training taking place last year and now continuing annually by Saratoga High School Health Teacher Amy Obenour, Nurse Lisa has trained most Los Gatos HS 9th graders through their PE classes and hundreds of 10th - 12th-grade students during tutorials. Students at both schools will continue to be trained each year in 9th grade, with an option for parents/guardians to opt out of their students if they so choose.

Metropolitan Education District Receives California Schools Public Relations Association (CalSPRA) Award of Excellence


