Spark student civic engagement during September High School Voter Education Weeks

Per California Education Code, the last two weeks of September are designated as High School Voter Education Weeks, a time for teens to learn about and prepare to engage in the democratic process. Schools are encouraged to partner with local county elections officials "to promote civic education and participation on campus and foster an environment that cultivates lifelong voters and active citizens," <u>according to</u> the Secretary of State's website.

As high schoolers return from summer break and refocus on academics and planning for life postgraduation, the department has a <u>Back-to-School Pre-Registration Toolkit</u> available to encourage eligible 16- and 17-year-olds to pre-register online to vote, with their registration becoming active upon turning 18. It is a task that can easily be added to their back-to-school checklist.

The toolkit includes sample social media posts, access to related video content, and informational items including a brochure, poster and a frequently asked questions sheet.

According to a March 2023 joint letter by State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tony Thurmond and California Secretary of State Shirley N. Weber, "since the California pre-registration program launched in September 2016, over 1 million students have pre-registered to vote."

A <u>guidance document</u> on the registration process is available for school administrators and teachers. Additionally, eligible high school students ages 16 and older can serve as poll workers during election season, and, with the passage of <u>Senate Bill 955</u> in 2022, students in grades 6-12 are permitted one excused absence per year to take part in a civic or political event if they give their school advance notice.

The Secretary of State's Office also compiled a<u>list of best practices</u> to promote civic engagement in high schools. Among the ideas shared by county elections offices is partnering with local educational agencies. District leaders can take the initiative to reach out to local elections officials to form a partnership.

Middle and high schools can also begin preparing to participate in the 2024 California Student Mock Election, scheduled to take place on Oct. 8, 2024.

"The Student Mock Election will stir students' interest in voting by tapping into the excitement of the campaign and election season," according to the Secretary of State's website. "As students learn about the candidates and issues, they discover how government and politics affect every part of their lives. They gain firsthand knowledge of how citizens make their voices heard in our democracy and experience the power of their votes when they are joined by thousands of California students who will vote in the California Student Mock Election next year."

Santa Clara County Office of Education Spotlight

Santa Clara County Office of Education Receives \$20M Grant to Bolster Education Workforce

The California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC) announced the Santa Clara County Office of Education (SCCOE) as the recipient of a \$20 million grant to expand and enhance the educational workforce across the state, thus strengthening the quality of public education.

"Investing in California's educational workforce is an investment in students," said Dr. Mary Ann Dewan, County Superintendent of Schools. "Having high-quality educators and counselors ensures students are provided a quality public education and are prepared to become thriving and impactful young adults." Funding for the grant is provided through the California state budget, signed by Governor Newsom in July 2022. Through the grant, the SCCOE will serve as a Statewide Residency Technical Assistance Center (SRTAC) providing expert advice and support to emerging and experienced leaders in local school districts. Aside from technical assistance, the SRTAC will focus on best practices for establishing residency programs, local recruitment, minimizing costs for participants, sustainable planning, and sharing information to provide equitable opportunities for teacher and school counselor candidates in residency programs.

In collaboration with the Humboldt, Sacramento, San Diego, and Tulare County Offices of Education, regional hubs will be established to provide localized support to districts in various parts of the state.

The SCCOE was selected as the recipient based on the organization's demonstrated expertise and experience in advising and supporting program leaders, according to Mary Vixie Sandy Ed. D., Executive Director of the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing.

As an educational institution, the SCCOE encourages the pursuit of knowledge. The SCCOE supports and provides technical assistance in the professional development of school employees, their strengths, and coaching abilities through its educator preparation programs and partnerships.

School District Highlights



Cambrian School District

Cambrian School District is first AGZA Certified School District in Silicon Valley

The Cambrian School District started off the school year quieter and healthier —a result of achieving AGZA Level 1 Green Zone® Certification for its entire school district operations.

The district replaced all of its handheld lawn and garden equipment with commercial rated battery electric alternatives. Gas-powered landscaping tools contribute to smog forming emissions, noise pollution and operator strain, which impacts learning environments, communities and equipment operators.

"I'm proud of our efforts to shift toward eco-friendly practices that reduce the district's carbon footprint overall," said Cambrian School District Superintendent Kristi Schwiebert.

AGZA Green Zone® Certification is an independently structured program involving education, training, certification, data collection, and metrics reporting to help achieve successful transitions and enduring change to cleaner, quieter, more sustainable landscape maintenance practices.

"The Cambrian School District values sustainability and being stewards of the environment," said Henry Cervantes, Facilities Director of Operations for the District. "Lowering emissions and noise, as well as improving health, are significant priorities in our district."

The positive impact reductions are measured by the ELF® (Environmental Landscape Footprint) report generated by AGZA and Quiet Communities. This independent report estimates that the electric transitions at Cambrian School District will eliminate a total of 16 tons of smog ozone forming emissions and 58 tons of carbon dioxide emissions annually—the equivalent of planting 2,400 trees. The reduction in impacts achieved by the district's efforts make possible more quiet, low impact landscape maintenance that improves the health and well-being of students, faculty, and visitors.
